LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT

With the recently released budget proposal from Governor Murphy it becomes more evident that we need to have meaningful change in the manner in which we approach our Business Community and the overall business climate here in New Jersey.

A couple of weeks ago, I attended the annual Walk to Washington, sponsored each year by the New Jersey State Chamber of Commerce, representing our Business interests here in Hunterdon County. This annual trip, which is attended by over two thousand individuals, spend time on a chartered train headed to Washington, DC. talking the business of New Jersey. The train is filled with representatives from business throughout the state, fellow Chamber colleagues, representatives from Higher Education, various fields from the medical community, the pharmaceutical and life science industries and elected officials.

We need to send a clear message to business that New Jersey is a partner in their success, not that we are here to over-regulate and continue to add tax after tax. New Jersey and Hunterdon County have so much to offer to make businesses succeed

New Jersey has had such a long history of innovation and companies that got their start here. One great example is that of famous inventor Thomas Edison, who also happened to be a founding-charter member of the New Jersey State Chamber of Commerce.

Our highly educated workforce is one of our strongest assets. Over half of our workforce possesses a Bachelor's degree and almost a quarter have attained advanced degrees making Hunterdon County a place of innovation and choice for our existing businesses. The signs here in Hunterdon County are very positive with the expansion and investment of ExxonMobil in Clinton Township. Another achievement for business in late 2018 was Unicom purchasing the former Merck Headquarters site, coupled with their vision of making that location a Science and Technology Park.

Hunterdon County offers the best in quality of life from our recreational opportunities, to the arts, culture and history. I truly believe that Hunterdon County has all the ingredients that make our region attractable to future investments and expansion. As Thomas Edison said, "There is no substitute for hard work." Let's continue to work to make Hunterdon County even better than it is and work collectively to change the Business Climate here in New Jersey.

NEW EFFORT BUILDS MUNICIPAL PARTNERSHIPS ALONG ROUTE 78 CORRIDOR IN HUNTERDON COUNTY

UPDATE FROM THE HUNTERDON COUNTY OFFICE OF ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

A new initiative in Hunterdon County is aimed at promoting its central corridors as a prime location for business. The 78/22 Coalition, an effort lead by Hunterdon County Economic Development, formed in 2018 in response to a recent increase from brokers and others in developing projects along the two corridors. The member communities' goals are to jointly vet these opportunities, work together to address growth, and to begin to work more collaboratively across a wide-range of issues.

"This committee is the first successful county effort to work collaboratively with all the towns along these two routes that are so crucial to the future viability of Hunterdon," said Freeholder Director Suzanne Lagay. "The best economic development is collaborative economic development." Hunterdon municipalities represented in the Coalition include Bloomsbury, Bethlehem, Union, Clinton, Clinton Township, Franklin, Lebanon Borough, and Readington. As some of its initial goals, the group will be working to promote the two corridors as prime locations for tech and entrepreneurial growth, seeking to leverage the presence along I-78 of corporate giants such as ExxonMobil and UNICOM Global, which recently purchased and occupied the more than 900-acre former Merck Headquarters in Readington Township.

"The presence of companies like ExxonMobil, whose R&D facility here holds hundreds of research laboratories, speaks very strongly to the skill level of our local workforce. This same workforce can support a wide array of industries requiring the ready availability of an educated workforce to reach their full potential," commented coalition member John Higgins, Mayor of Clinton Township.



Aside from a talented workforce, town officials believe they can also successfully leverage their proximity to New York City, Philadelphia, and the growing Lehigh Valley to attract companies, in addition to factors such as affordable land and office space versus other New Jersey locales, beautiful surroundings, and the willingness of town and county officials to work closely with companies to support their endeavors.

According to Hunterdon County Economic Development, the county and towns are finalizing their priorities for the next few years but that, already on the list, will be a 2019 website launch which will include an interactive corridor map for detailed exploration of participating communities. Additionally, the towns will be creating an advocacy agenda for addressing larger issues with state officials such as transportation, and will be considering research such as a targeted industry study, aimed at site specific evaluations of "highest and best use" for the corridors' available properties and stranded assets.

"We are determined to maintain a vibrant economy here for years to come so that our young folks can grow their lives and careers locally and so we can continue to attract top talent to Hunterdon," said Paul Muir, mayor of Bethlehem Township. "A pro-active and cooperative effort such as this Coalition is a huge part of doing just that."

The 78/22 Coalition meets monthly in the town of Clinton. The Hunterdon County Chamber of Commerce President Chris Phelan attends these meetings regularly to represent the business community of Hunterdon County. 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

2019 HACKHUNTERDON DATES ANNOUNCED

Hunterdon County's annual hackathon, a 24-hour tech product creation competition, is now accepting applications for this year's event to be held on June 8th and 9th at Hunterdon Central Regional High School in Flemington, New Jersey.

The HackHunterdon Hackathon annually invites the regions' technologists, entrepreneurs, students and other innovators to be part of the marathon-style gathering to build new projects, connect with fellow technologists, be inspired, and ultimately pitch their ideas for prizes and potential investment. Additionally, sponsoring companies have directly recruited participants at each of the previous two hackathons.

The event is in it's third year and is run by three regional economic development partners- Hunterdon County Economic Development, the Hunterdon County Chamber of Commerce and Flemington Community Partnership.

Marc Saluk, Economic Development Director of Hunterdon County said, "The hackathon is a great annual opportunity to identify and bring together our local tech talent. This gives them a chance to work with each other and us a chance to partner with them long term to continue to cement Hunterdon County as a hub of innovation."

Chamber of Commerce President Chris Phelan agrees.

"The hackathon is a primary piece of a collaborative, long-term effort to encourage small business and innovation growth in Hunterdon County," commented Phelan. "Teams from previous events are still working together to develop and bring their ideas to market."

Phelan emphasized though that just plain "fun' is a key element to the success of the hackathon, adding that special events, games, cool swag, and plenty of free food and caffeine are provided in an effort to keep energy levels up and make for a memorable event.

Last years' hackathon had 78 participants that divided into 22 competing teams, with about half of those being composed of high school students. In addition to bringing a lot of energy to the event, Saluk stated that student teams took two of the top three prizes while competing directly against teams composed of adults.

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

Tax Tidbit:
Tax Scam Alerts &
How to Defend Yourself



Now is the time for tax fraud and theft. As the IRS continues to neutralize these threats, scammers are developing improved tactics to steal your identity and tax refund. Here is a recap of what the IRS is seeing this year:

- More sophisticated email scams A recent IRS alert warns taxpayers to be on the lookout for new, sophisticated email phishing scams. Thieves may use these fraudulent emails to try to access your personal data through a hyperlink or trick you into providing financial information. This year, thieves are better able to make emails look like they are coming directly from the IRS. Your defense: The IRS will not contact you via email asking for personal or financial information so do not provide it! If you receive a suspicious email, don't click any links or open any attachments. Simply forward the message to phishing@irs.gov and delete it.
- More realistic phone scams Scammers are going to great lengths to impersonate the IRS by providing fake badge numbers and appearing as the IRS on your caller ID. They may threaten you with a lawsuit or with arrest, demanding that you make an immediate payment over the phone. Your defense: If you get a call from someone claiming to be the IRS, hang up immediately. The IRS does not call and ask for information over the phone. Even if you think it's actually the IRS, get the caller's name and badge number. Then hang up and call back directly to the IRS at 1-800-829-1040. Do not call back on a phone number provided to you by the caller!
- Evolving identity theft scams Scam artists are now going around you to get your information. A popular scam is to send a phishing email to your employer's human resources department with the intention of getting your W-2 information. Once they have enough of your information, they file a fake tax return and send the refund to their bank account. You won't know it happened until you file your tax return and the IRS rejects it. Your defense: File your tax return as soon as possible to shrink the filing window available to crooks.

Stay alert, be skeptical and protect your information. If you think your information is stolen, ask for help. The IRS has staff to help correct your situation and will place you in their identity theft protection program. Contact us at (908) 782-7900 to speak with one of our tax or fraud specialists.
