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AN EVENING OF LEADERSHIP WITH STEDMAN GRAHAM



The Hunterdon County Chamber of Commerce Foundation held An Evening of Leadership with Stedman Graham on Tuesday, November 12th. The evening was attended by over 200 attendees, which included leaders of communities and local high school students.

The evening keynote speaker, Stedman Graham, a New York Times best-selling author and educator and a New Jersey native. The event was held at the Hunterdon Central Regional High School as part of The Hunterdon County Chamber of Commerce Foundation's Evening of Leadership Presented by Unity Bank Center for Business & Entrepreneurship.

In his twelfth book, entrepreneur Stedman Graham lays out a roadmap to more effective and purposeful leadership. He discusses successful leaders and uses anecdotes from his own life to illustrate the importance of identity leadership in each of our lives.

Originally from Whitesboro, NJ, Stedman Graham is the Chairman and CEO of S. Graham & Associates and has a reputation for being a thought leader who helps businesses and individuals. His message of self-awareness and positive thinking delivered thought provoking, real life scenarios of how one's identity can be lost amidst the speculations and opinions of those around you, not directly connected to you, the individual. He goes on to share how, as a young African American man growing up in a predominately African American neighborhood surrounded by a county of predominately white people, Stedman was not viewed as someone to achieve in life – mainly because of where he was raised and by opinions of others.

Stedman went on to prove them wrong while pursuing his drive to achieve in his life and to share those achievements with so many. Stedman was very inspired by his one brother, Jimmy, who was a special-needs young man. Stedman felt that if his brother can go on day to day and make something of life and achievements of his own, why can't he? Why can't others?

Stedman has dedicated his time teaching college classes, leading non-profit organizations, speaking around the world as well as many other initiatives. Stedman's focus on bringing awareness to the leadership skill, which is important, a key element to everyone of all ages, race, etc.

In his book *Identity Leadership*, Stedman details a nine-step road map for individuals to take on and develop their leadership skill and become more self-aware.



Without a strong identity, people are more likely to be carried by the influence of their environment into a future requiring very little reflection or development. In order to be a leader, you must first lead yourself was the strong message by Stedman. This message carried through the audience had many people reflecting on their own lives, understanding that everyone can be a leader, but you must start with yourself first.

Students were very engaged during the Q&A, some asking for Stedman's opinion on education tracks, skills, how to become a successful entrepreneur. Other engaged with him one-on-one after the presentation.

It is estimated that over 2,500 people attended this year's show. The popular Food Showcase highlighted 13 local restaurants, providing samplings from sliders to sub sandwiches. The showcase gave consumers the opportunity to sample cuisine for free and get to know the local restaurants.

New this year was the Authors' Nook which brought in eight local authors from diverse genres including children's books, industrial psychology, self-help, home repair and travel. Also generating excitement was Rago Arts of Lambertville, who provided evaluations on antiques and art brought in by attendees. Rago's presence was greatly appreciated.

Nex Level Arena also opened their Nex Level Ninja obstacle course to young Expo goers who were aged five years to adult. Some of the young Ninjas also demonstrated the course to the public during the food showcase.

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Tax Tidbit:

Cash In on 0% Capital Gains Tax Rate

While the maximum capital gain tax rate can be as high as 23.8 percent, most taxpayers pay 15 percent. But there is the possibility to have your capital gains go tax-free; zero percent! In fact, this tax break has been around for more than a decade and comes into play more often than you may think. Here is what you should know:

Oualifying for the 0% capital gains rate

You qualify for preferential long-term gain treatment if you sell stocks, bonds or real estate (and other capital assets) you've owned longer than a year. For 2019, the zero percent rate applies to long-term capital gains for single taxpayers with taxable income up to \$39,375 and married filing joint taxpayers up to \$78,750. This often applies if you're having a low income tax year due to:

- Temporary job loss-
- A tax loss passed through to you from an
- S corporation or partnership
- Income fluctuation for a commission-based job
- Retirement
- Moving to part-time employment

Awareness is the key - While you may not typically have the zero capital gain tax rate available to you, it is important to note when it comes into play.

Here's an example: Adam and Eve Johnson recently retire. They have a number of mutual funds they've owned for years and have retirement savings accounts. Their current income is \$58,700. Should they withdraw money from a retirement account or sell some of their mutual funds? Because they're aware of the zero percent capital gains, they decide to sell mutual funds with long-term capital gains of \$20,000 this year to get the money tax free!

Consider your year-end tax moves - So, keep the zero percent capital gains rate in mind as the year winds down. Know your projected income for the year and depending on your situation, you might realize capital gains that are subject to no or lower tax rates. ONE VOICE WEEKEND: OCTOBER 18-20, 2019 FAITH COMMUNITIES ADDRESSED THE HARMFUL TREND OF TEEN VAPING

Each year a topic of interest and concern is identified by One Voice of Hunterdon County, Inc., a faith based prevention coalition. This year the timely topic addressed —the harms of teen vaping. In the past year, the Surgeon General declared e-cigarette (vape) use among youth a national epidemic and all 5 regional high schools in Hunterdon County have seen a dramatic rise in teen use of e-cigarettes. According to Peggy Dowd, Program Director for One Voice, "We are beginning to see a whole new generation becoming addicted to nicotine. Not only are we trying to prevent teen use, but also provide resources for those who are already addicted to vaping".

One Voice is a partner in a countywide project, Hunterdon United for Vape-Free Youth, and is working with the Safe Communities Coalition and community leaders to address the growing concern surrounding youth vaping. One Voice works to provide information, education and resources through our faith communities with the goal of increasing outreach in our community to make informed decisions about vaping.

Rev. Harry Mazujian, Project Outreach Coordinator for One Voice explains, "The power of One Voice is to reach thousands of people in one weekend with an important message that affects our entire community. Ideally, every place of worship would address this issue on the same weekend". This year, One Voice weekend took place October 18-20. In preparation for One Voice weekend, faith leaders along with community leaders were invited to a summit entitled The Harmful Trend of Teen Vaping: Keys for Faith Leaders and Parents, where they were educated on the topic of vaping, and given materials to be distributed within their place of worship. Each faith leader decides the best delivery/approach for their congregation.



Suggested methods to share the knowledge include: preach as part of the Homily/Sermon, host a guest speaker on the topic for Youth Group or Parent Night, incorporate into Religious Education classes, include in Announcements and/or Prayers of the Faithful, insert information in Bulletins, post on Website... or a combination of these suggested methods. All materials were also provided in Spanish.

Places of worship participating in One Voice weekend or that have recently held education events on Teen Vaping include: Califon United Methodist Church, Cokesbury United Methodist Church, First Unitarian Universalist Fellowship of Hunterdon County, Flemington Presbyterian Church, Flemington United Methodist Church, Frenchtown Presbyterian Church, Grace United Church of Christ, Our Lady of Lourdes, Our Lady of Victories, Readington Reformed Church,South Ridge Community Church, St. Anna Greek Orthodox Church, St. Magdalen de Pazzi Roman Catholic Church, St. Thomas Episcopal Church, Stockton Presbyterian Church, The Salvation Army and Unity Spiritual Center.
