FLEMINGTON BOROUGH DESIGNATED AS OPPORTUNITY ZONE

Reprinted Press Release from Historic Borough of Flemington

The recently established Opportunity Zone Committee for the Borough of Flemington met to discuss the goals of the committee and how best to leverage the Borough's designation as an Opportunity Zone.

The "Opportunity Zones Program" was created by the U.S. Congress in December 2017 and federally recognizes certain geographic areas as Opportunity Zones in order to encourage long-term investment in lower-income areas (as determined by U.S. Census data). Opportunity Zones provide a tax-incentive to investors in return for a, minimally, seven year investment in these communities.

"Flemington Borough's Opportunity Zone designation gives us incredible leverage to attract the right kind of development that fits our beautiful town. We are looking forward to leveraging this opportunity into sustainable future growth," says Borough of Flemington Mayor, Betsy Driver.

The State of New Jersey, County of Hunterdon, and Borough of Flemington have all expressed their support for the Opportunity Zones initiative. The private business community has shown support for this initiative and is represented on Flemington's Opportunity Zone Committee in order to work to maximize this federal opportunity. The Committee seeks to market this Opportunity Zone designation in order to attract investment and will include a Flemington focused Opportunity Zone Summit to showcase the Borough of Flemington to developers, investors, and planners. The summit is set for July 11th.

DOES TRENTON WANT HUNTERDON COUNTY TO SUCCEED?



The Hunterdon County Chamber of Commerce is submitting its position to the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection regarding their efforts to reclassify 749 miles of waterways in New Jersey from Category 2 to a Category 1 designation. This includes the South Branch River that runs through Hunterdon County.

The Chamber is truly committed to the preservation of all of the natural resources that make Hunterdon County such a beautiful and pristine part of our State. However, this reclassification will potentially have a huge impact on the future redevelopment and repurposing of many commercial sites throughout the County. In order to have a favorable business climate and encourage opportunities, the State of New Jersey needs to make its regulations and the process by which decisions are made transparent and predictable.

We have seen, like the rest of the State, a major shift in demographics over the past decade here in Hunterdon County. Declining population, businesses relocating to other regions, increased burden on the business community in terms of regulations and demands have all had detrimental effects. However, despite these challenges, in the past 8-10 months we are beginning to see progress in the right direction.

This movement is starting to drive confidence back in the commercial investment market here in Hunterdon County and there are positive indicators of where our economy is headed. There are companies that are making significant investments in Hunterdon County. ExxonMobil located in Clinton Township is finishing up a major reinvestment into its site, which has expanded their workforce. Unicom Global has purchased the former Merck headquarters site and is positioning it as a research and technology park.

At the end of the day, this re-classification of waterways has the great potential of hampering if not shutting down development and investment throughout Hunterdon County. The impact this might have on our Municipal Sewer and Water Authorities to provide adequate supply for the demand to grow our County will be stifled. A very good example is that the Borough of Flemington which utilizes the Township of Raritan's Municipal Utility Authority could be greatly impacted on future growth. The lack of capacity the Raritan Township Municipal Utility Authority might be restricted to in the future will mean less water and sewer capacity to bring the Borough of Flemington back to its full economic potential.

New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection needs to put forth the clear and transparent way they have come to their conclusions on making these determinations. They need to hear what the municipalities are saying regarding their economic futures and how this rule change will greatly hinder commercial investment in this region. One of the greatest assets Hunterdon County has is our beautiful landscape and mix of communities and commerce. However, with the number of existing commercial properties that don't have existing tenants or the number of properties that are currently underutilized, the State of New Jersey needs to work with our communities to ensure that we can not just survive, but thrive.

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How Much Market Risk Are You Really Willing to Accept? Miche Ameripr

If you're like a lot of investors, you may have trouble quantifying the level of risk you are comfortable taking on in your portfolio. Do you like to play it safe, staying in conservative investments even if it means potentially missing out on bigger returns? Or are you willing to take on more risk in the hopes of capturing higher gains? If you're not sure where you land on the spectrum, consider the following eight tips to help define your views on investment risk:

- 1. Define your goals. Your financial plan should be structured to help you get from where you are now to where you'd like to be with key goals, such as saving for your child's college education or retirement. Your investment strategy should be a key part of this financial plan. Define exactly how much money you will need to save, and when you will need it by. When your goals are crystal clear, it can be easier to weigh the various risks and choices you must make to achieve them.
- 2. Consider the general market environment. It seems fair to say that investors' willingness to accept risk increases in periods when the stock market has performed well for an extended period of time. In the past decade, stocks have generally been on the upswing. On the heels of such a positive market, investors' level of confidence about owning assets that are subject to fluctuation may be higher. By contrast, investors sometimes become more skittish in periods when markets are struggling. Confidence in stocks and other variable investments tends to decline when the market is not performing well.
- 3. Accept market moves as normal. It's a known fact that stock markets move up and down sometimes significantly which means there's always risk that a particular investment could lose value. Keep in mind that historically markets have recovered, and the reward potential of investing in future growth of global businesses remains strong. Prepare yourself for the fact that investing is not a smooth upward climb, and a smart strategy can help the market moves work in your favor.
- 4. Recognize that time is one of the biggest influences on risk tolerance. If you have a decade or more to reach your goals (such as retirement), you likely can ride out market downturns or even extended flat or negative markets. If you expect to reach your goals (such as a new home) in the next few years, you may need to think more about how to protect your investments against the impact of market moves. With this in mind, your risk tolerance will likely adjust as you get closer to achieving various goals.
- 5. Trust your instincts, but don't make decisions solely based on emotions. If you are worried about what's ahead in the markets or how your finances would fare if another Great Recession occurs, it may be time to reassess your portfolio to take some risk off the table. Yet, it's important to not be overly swayed by day-to-day headlines. Look for consistent, long-term trends or events that impact market fundamentals before considering action. And, be sure that any decisions you make align with your financial goals, as defined in tip #1 above.



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

Tax Tidbit: Should you Incorporate Your Business?



If you're a sole proprietor, you have probably wondered at some point whether you'd be better off if you incorporated your business. Here are some facts for you to consider.

- The single biggest benefit of incorporating a business is limiting an owner's liability. In theory, a stockholder in a corporation risks only his or her investment in the corporation stock. A lawsuit against the company generally cannot be satisfied by attaching the stockholder's personal assets. In practice, most small corporation stockholders must personally guarantee bank loans for their corporations. Thus, if the corporation fails, the stockholder's personal assets are at risk. In addition, where personal services are involved, the individual performing the services may be personally liable for his or her actions even though the business is incorporated.
- -The second advantage of operating as a corporation is that it may be easier to raise capital because the business can do so by issuing stock and selling bonds.
- -A third advantage is that ownership interest in a corporation is easier to transfer than in a sole proprietorship.
- -A corporation files its own tax return and pays its own income tax. Therein lies the major drawback to the corporate form: business profits may be taxed twice once at the corporate level and again at the shareholder level when paid out as dividends or liquidating distributions. Double taxation can generally be avoided by electing S corporation or LLC status.

The corporate form does allow for more fringe benefits that are deductible by the corporation and tax-free to employees, including an owner-employee.

Economic development has been a major initiative of the Hunterdon County Freeholders for many years, and now the effort has a new website, along with a new brand and bold messaging.



NightingaleNJ's Chris Kellogg (pictured at right, far left) joined healthcare experts at the recent NJ Spotlight roundtable discussion to address end-of-life care in New Jersey. The 90-minute roundtable, convened at Rutgers University's New Brunswick campus, focused on the need for better end-of-life planning and ways the state can support that process.



The panel, which included NJ Health Commissioner Dr. Shereef Elnahal and NJ Hospital Association CEO Cathy Bennett, agreed that communication is the key. Just over one fourth of state residents have recorded their wishes. Less than 1/3 of residents die at home despite their wishes, and 25% die in hospitals- the third highest percentage nationwide. "Older adults are generally not afraid of dying," Kellogg said. "They are afraid of pain and anguish. They are afraid of not living where they want to live, and they are afraid of being a burden to their loved ones." Avoiding hard conversations means families must make agonizing decisions in times of crisis, when they are least equipped to do so. NightingaleNJ Eldercare Navigators is partnering with the NJ Health Care Quality Institute to facilitate the Conversation Of Your Life (COYL) initiative, which aims to bring advance care

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
